Muir Woods Methodology

Start: (A1) Muir Woods -- Park where possible. I have a parking pass that can be used for this area which I can share by text. Poke into the park, looking for Pacific Wrens and other expected species. Don't worry about spending too much time here as it will quickly fill with tourists and probably has the lowest species diversity of the area. Be sure to arrive early to beat crowds. Gates open at 8 AM. 37°53'30.2"N 122°34'09.0"W [plug into Google Maps, e.g.:

(A2) Conlon -- Drive out of Muir Woods along Frank Valley Rd (FVR) until you reach Conlon Ave on your left. Park either in the Conlon Ave lot or along FVR. Check this spot for sensitive species like Spotted Owl and Common Poorwill, both of which were here in the spring (2022?). 37°53'25.1"N 122°34'00.2"W; or https://www.google.com/maps/place/37°53'10.9%22N+122°34'05.0%22W/@37.886454.-

(A3) Frank Valley Rd -- Bird the riparian corridor going southwest along FVR and access the Redwood Creek Trail where possible. Check for expected species. May require passing a creek.

Southern Marin CBC—Muir Woods Area (unedited map link) The most efficient way to bird this area is with two teams (here A and B). A should start in the valley and work its way out while B will bird the ridge line that encircles the canyons/valleys that contain Muir Woods. Parking will be the biggest challenge. (A4) Kent Canyon -- This area is closed to the public but the residents have been notified that the CBC will be taking place. Mention that Mia Monroe made the park aware and that we're subbing in for Dave MacKenzie. Bird the oak woodland habitat of this area, targeting Wild Turkey and sparrows. Consider throwing out seed to check on your hike back.

End: (A5) Diaz Ridge -- Drive out of the Redwood Creek valley along FVR (still going southwest). Bird any interesting pullout but note that **the area ends shortly after Kent Canyon along FVR**. Drive out of Muir Beach along Hwy 1/Shoreline Hwy then take the sharp left onto Panoramic Hwy. Park at the Diaz Ridge trailhead and bird along Diaz Ridge with remaining light. A5 B1

Southern Marin CBC—Muir Woods Area (unedited map link) -- The most efficient way to bird this area is with two teams (here A and B). Start: (B1) Pantoll Campground -- Park in the free parking on right off Pantoll Rd near where it splits off from Panoramic Hwy. Bird down the Coastal Fire Rd. Trail. Take Deer Park Fire Rd where it intersects the Coastal Fire Rd. Bird down Deer Park Fire Rd as long as you find it productive. Be sure to reach where the trail opens up to some grassland habitat. When finished hike back the way you entered. B2 B3 B4

(B2) Mountain Home Inn -- Drive clockwise along the circle edge on Panoramic Hwy to the Mountain home Inn. Feel free to stop at any interesting pullouts along the way were space is available. Once at the Inn, scan the overlook for raptors or finches. Then bird the residential area behind the Inn, primarily along Edgewood Ave.

(B3) Tourists Inn and Sun Trail -- Park wherever you can find parking along/near Ridge Ave. off Panoramic Hwy. Bird the residential area below and scan for raptors. If time, hike down the road that takes you down to the Nature Friends Tourist Club, then hike the Sun Trail and make a loop (private property permitting) back to Ridge Ave. Otherwise hike in and out while targeting the open chaparral habitat along the Sun Trail. More densely forested areas at this stop should be checked for sapsuckers.

End: (B4) Muir Woods Rd down -- Time permitting, bird along Muir Woods Rd from where it starts off Panoramic Hwy/Four Corners down to the park. Use any available pullouts to access the Dipsea Trail that largely parallels Muir Woods Rd to the south. Search for oak woodland birds or any other species you may have missed.

Whew! Sounds like a fun and busy time! I still have not had any details from leadership of the count so we'll go with the protocol from last year.

Here are the notes from last year that I sent out then, with revisions for this year. ALISON, CHIME IN IF I'VE LEFT SOMETHING OUT.

<u>Timing:</u> Meet at my house, <u>4 Eucalyptus Knoll St., Mill Valley</u> (near Hauke park and next to Public Safety Building) <u>at 7:25.</u> We'll likely be out until 2 or 3. Alternatively, you could meet us at the unmarked Muir Woods parking lot described below.

<u>Weather:</u> Weather report for Saturday shows light rain until 9 but the weather report fooled us last year and we had rain most of the day. RAIN DOESN'T CANCEL. Bring a change of jacket, socks, shoes, gloves, etc. just in case.

Lunch: Don't forget yours! Maybe a hot beverage in a thermos, too.

Bring a national park card if you have one. I think mine gets 4 people in.

Transport & Parking: 4 of us can fit in my car comfortably, and 5 less comfortably, so that likely means we'll need 2 cars. The parking place is the overflow parking lot at Muir Woods. It is the 3d parking lot (closest to Muir Beach); it's on the right and is not marked. You'll have to pull in, open the gate, go in, and lock the gate behind you. Lock combo for gate is 1050. **NOTE**: last year we were able to park across the street because we couldn't get the gate open — it turned out to be unlocked!

Cellphone (non)coverage: Cell coverage may be spotty.

Prime areas to cover:

- 1. First, we'll cross the street to look for Varied Thrush (listen to their song/call—we may hear it). Over there is Conlon Canyon (unmarked) where we can listen and look for spotted owls, saw-whet owls, common poorwills and maybe hear a Great-horned Owl.
- 2. Then I think we should head toward the entrance to Muir Woods to look for Pileated Woodpeckers (and about ¼ mile in on the east side) and possibly Pacific Wrens.
- 3. Then we'll go to the access for the Redwood CreekTrail: https://maps.app.goo.gl/oL56esZboNPLo8Gu8. go down the Redwood Creek Trail toward Muir Beach. It's on the left after Muir Woods Rd. becomes Frank Valley Rd. heading toward Muir Bh from Muir Woods. Here are the coordinates which you can plug into Google Maps: 37°52'55.3"N 122°34'30.2"W. It is recommended by our precessors that we spend 30-40% of our time in this area.

We'll walk south, i.e. away from Muir Woods. It will bring us to a less densely wooded habitat where the productivity might be greater, improving the species diversity. Likely good for

detecting raptors, both in the sky and along the telephone poles. It'il also conveniently lead us to the facilities on private land here: https://maps.app.goo.gi/u3fqDM1EjzUSCnNe7. This was a very productive area in previous years (I think we counted maybe 100 American Robins here last year. There are also Western Bluebirds and excellent sparrow diversity.

4. When we're done I think we'll be heading up to Pantoll, bird the parking lot (there was a juvenile Red-shouldered Hawk last year), and go down the Coastal Fire Rd. to Deer Park Fire Rd. toward Muir Woods. 37°53'51.6"N 122°35'56.3"W.

Other spots:

- 5. Alice Eastwood FR, 37°54'29.7"N 122°34'33.3"W, (code 8780) to Eastwood Camp (spotted owls), but it was very unproductive when we went there last year;
- 6. Ridge Avenue, 37°53'52.1"N 122°33'59.0"W, where there can be sapsuckers. We found their neat rows of holes on the trees there but saw no sapsuckers.
- 7. Then Diaz Ridge off Panoramic for raptors, towhees, quail, wrentits, kites.





Hi Allison!

I just talked to Dave McKenzie (415-203-7428) who did Muir Woods for years and he gave me a ton of info which I'll try to set forth here.

He said to call Mia Monroe (GGNRA liaison, 415-725-1630) to try to get a parking permit for Muir Woods because there are several different places he suggests parking over the course of the day and we may need to park more than one car to be able to cover more territory. I will call her after Thanksgiving.

I'm attaching the 2 maps of Muir Woods from the CBC web page. I've asked for a list of the birds observed there because the thing marked "list" is not a list.

He suggests going down to MW parking lots 2 and 3 (canyon nearby) before sunrise (which I might try to do alone unless you really want to get up that early) to listen for spotted & saw whet owls. He says ok to call for the latter which might make the former call.

Then:

- 1. Go down Redwood Creek a couple of miles toward Muir Bh. He says to bird along the way and also at the ranger camp about a mile down, and to spend 30-40% of our time/effort there.
- 2. Then park at Pantoll, bird just above and below it, then walk down the Deer Park fire road. He says there's forest, then a beautiful SF panorama, then it crosses the Dipsea.
- 3. Then Panoramic to about 2 miles above the turn to MW to Ridge Rd. There's a parking area and a really twisty road, and there are sapsuckers there.
- 4. Then Diaz Ridge for raptors and kites (in my notes it says "near Pantoll" but I don't think that's right--it was part of my breeding bird territory).
- 5. Also, there's a paved road to Camp Eastwood but you need the combination for the lock, which I'll ask Mia for. He said there are spotted owls there.

Food for thought! Good idea to go reconnoiter. When is good for you?
